This is a brief history of Charles Leo Studer as related from the memory of his brother Joe M. Studer.

Chuck as we called him, was the third son of Joseph and Margaret (Mag) Studer. Chuck finished his education in a one room country school in district 41 in Benton County. Mrs. Lubesmeyer was the teacher.

Chuck became fond of the fourteen horses that we had on the farm. He soon cared for them and did turn out being a very good horseman. Because of the those fourteen horses, plus a hundred head of cattle; a good water well was needed. A 75 foot deep well with appropriate pipe, was dug. One summer day Chuck left the team of

horses hitched together with the neck yoke on. He left them standing in the yard while he went to the house to get

a drink. Dad had warned him not to do this many times, but once again the team was left unattended. When Chuck went into the house, the horses decided to get a drink from a tub of water under the well spout. When they were done, they lifted their heads up, the neck yoke caught under the spout. They were frightened by this and in unison started backing up. The team kept backing up until the whole seventy feet of pipe and cylinder from the well were bent and laying in the yard. Boy oh boy, when Dad saw that, the stuff hit the fan.

In the winters Chuck would work out for other farmers. It was during this time period that Chuck befriended a young man named Irvin Mahigan. Irvin was in his first year of teaching school. Chuck invited him to come along and spend a weekend at the Studer home. Irvin was a wonderful guy and we all came to like him like a brother. Soon he became a brother in law, as sister Gen married Robert (Irvin) Mahigan.

Chuck also spent one winter with Uncle Ed and Aunt Clara on their farm in Corwith, Iowa. One winter he worked at Montgomery Wards Catalog Department, in St. Paul. One summer Chuck and Jim each used a team of horses in the Barretts gravel pit. Chuck also had a route as

a salesman for Bowes Seal Fast Company/automobile products. At one point Chuck was a bulk delivery man with his own truck for the Stearns County Farm Bureau. Chuck also farmed with dad on the Mayhew Lake farm. Chuck married Angeline Czech in November of 1942. He then farmed for himself, renting the Henry Voight farm 2 miles east of Mayhew Lake. After several job changes and moves Chuck went back to to farming. He and his family milked cows and farmed. He drove truck for Albert Oehrline,

Art Hess packing company. Angie worked for the St Cloud Poultry and egg company for many years. In his age Chuck gave up the heavy work and became assessor for the township of Sauk Rapids. He was also an appraiser for the State on flood damage after a cloudburst in the Mille Lacs Lake area.

Chuck finally ended up as a real estate salesman. He sold the farm bought a house in St. Cloud and lived there a few years. Chuck became ill with a blood vessel difficulty in the leg and after several strokes, died at the U of M hospital April 3, 1979.



Genevieve attended country schools and the Cathedral High School in St. Cloud. She took piano lessons and could play quite well. In fact, she could play so well, that when the Federal Agents came to pull a surprise raid on our home, she sat down to the piano and played all the while the agents were searching the house. They didn't find anything as all the moonshine was hidden in the piano itself. For more details, ask some of her brothers.

Genevieve grew up in the Flapper Era and was a good Charleston dancer. Her brother Charles (Chuck as we called him) was working in Minden Township, (for the winter months) for a family by the name of Jacoby. He met a young school teacher named, Irvin Mahigan. Chuck and Irvin became friends and chuck invited Irv to spend a weekend at our home. This was the beginning of a friendship in that Gen became Mrs. Irvin Mahigan. Irvin continued his studies and became a High School Principal at Oslo, Minnesota. Later he became a High School Superintendent of Schools in Beardsley, Minnesota. From there Gen and Irv moved to Wayzata, Minnesota, where Irvin became





Joe Martin Studer was born the fifth child of Joseph A. and Margaret Anastasia-Mag, (Dowling) Studer on the farm my grandfather bought when he and the family migrated here from Wesley, Iowa in 1900. That farm is now know as the Jack Orehline farm located two miles south of the MN Sate reformatory.

Our family then moved to a farm in Stearns County, St. Augusta Township, known as the "Farm Beautiful" which is now owned by Zabinski Bros. After a few years there, father had an auction sale, and then we moved to the Kiekow farm in Minden Township. At that time I recall that the first World War was on. I started school at Benton County District #29 at seven years old.

In the spring of 1920 we moved north to the Sartell farm, I attended and graduated from the eight grade at Benton County District #41, one room school. The school

was located just west one half mile of the Sartell farm. Then I became involved in the Joe Studer Livestock Trucking to South St. Paul.

In 1937 I married Bernice Heltemes and lived in the town of Mayhew Lake. We rented one half of a house owned by John Fleegle Sr. In 1940 we moved to Foley, MN and I helped Dad and brother Bob operate a livestock buying station for Cudahy Packing Company. With World War II and draft status, I left the business and worked for one year at the Dezurik Corp. in Sartell, MN. Because of draft status, Bob left the business, and through the Army Engineers Seventh Service Command in Omaha, Nebraska Bob and I were trained

and assigned to the Northwest Territory in Canada and worked for Betchel Price and Callahan on the canal project. It was a pipe line from the Macinzie River near the Arctic circle to White Horse, Canada. After thirteen months we returned to Foley.

In January of 1945 I and my family moved to the home farm on Mayhew Lake, we farmed there for 2 years. The farm was then auctioned off and I bought a truck with the proceeds. I became a feeder pig dealer. Then in 1951 we bought a 20 acre farm three

miles east of Sauk Rapids. Along with the pig business I worked ten years, part-time, for the Minden Township as a building and sanitation official. I retired from both in 1978. Bernice worked for the May Printing Company of St. Cloud, for over 20 years.

I have traveled to Europe three times. Visiting Oberbruck, Alsace, France the cradle for the Studers. Bernice and I also traveled to Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, Canada.

As of this date May 16, 1992, my wife is 76 and I am 79 years old. We are in good health and living on our 20 acre farm three miles east of Sauk Rapids. We are enjoying life together.

Highlights from Willard (Bill) Studers life. Willard was born Vincent Willard Studer March 2, 1915 in his grandfathers home in east St. Cloud, Minnesota. His early education was in the country one room school which was walking distance from the farm.

In 1932 Scarlet fever had hit the Studer family. As a result Willard developed Rheumatic Fever. He had to stay in bed for several weeks; in a hot upstairs bedroom. To a young man, it felt like a prison. This illness had serious repurcusions on his health in later years.

The Depression had a profound effect on all our lives. In the 1930's the country was financially and morally bankrupt. Newly elected president Franklin C. Roosevelt started the Civilian Conservation Corps. C.C.C. Willard joined in 1936 and still says it was some of the best years of his life. The C.C.C. was the only government group that worked to save our countries environment on a national scale. The C.C.C. worked to slow down erosion, replant the depleted forest, and built

more than a thousand national, state, county and city parks. Willards pay was \$30 a month, \$25 of which was sent home to

his family.

encouraged to come home for a gas station job and later sold cars. A new car cost \$600.00 and his commission on a sale was 4%. In the March of 1941 Willard hitch hiked to Rockford, Illinois. There he found a job as a Private chauffeur for the Lathrop family. For Willard, night school led to a job at Barber Coleman Co. in Rockford. This was the

called April of 1942 Willard had to return to MN for the draft call. His heart showed the effects of Rheumatic Fever and as a result he was not drafted. Besides he was already doing defense work. After the war factories were converting to peace time production and workers were layed off, work was again hard

to find. Hoping to find work Bill and Louise moved back to St. Cloud in 1945. But the job market wasn't much better and after a year Bill was on the move again. This time to Dubuque Iowa. He found a job and bought a

farm for himself, Louise and the children to live on. Bill worked in the John Deere factory until 1953. But the tool dust was too much for him and he then sold the farm and moved back to Minnesota. They purchased a farm near Popple Creek and started farming from what seemed like scratch. Using heat lamps in the winter time to keep baby piggies warm resulted in our barn burning down. After that

Bill eased up on farming and took a job at DeZurik Valve Factory. Once again there was tool dust. In hind sight we feel we made a mistake in moving back to Minnesota. We should have taken a vacation. But farming seemed to be the answer at the time.

Bill sold insurance for St. Paul Hospital & Casualty Co. until it went out of business. In 1969 we sold the farm land for what we had paid for the entire farm and bought a house in St.

Cloud in 1970. Bill had his second heart attack on Easter Monday in 1973. He was 58 years old. Bill and Louise are alive and happily living in St. Cloud, MN. They shared their 50 wedding anniversary in July of 1991.

She attended grade school for the first and second grades at Benton county school District #41. The School was located south of Mayhew Lake. It was there that her sister-in-law Rose (the wife of her oldest brother James), would be her first teacher.

Dad (Joe A) bought a farm at the north end of the Mayhew Lake and Mary Ellen finished the rest of the eight grades at Benton County district #25.

Mary Ellen went to High School in Sauk Rapids for the next 2 years. It was there that she and her brother Larry were bachelors and took care of themselves. Mary Ellens sophomore year was lonely and difficult. She was 14 years old and her family was quarantined for Scarlet Fever and she didn't see any of them for about 4 months,




In 1956 I went to work as an agent for the Metropolitian Life Insurance Company. I retired April of 1981.



My name is Daniel Patrick Studer, I am the youngest of ten children born to Margaret A. (Dowling) and Joseph Alexander Studer. I was born February 13, 1926 in the St. Rapheals Hospital, St. Cloud, Minnesota. In order for mother to deliver me, brother Robert had to drive Mother and Father to the hospital, through a snow storm, following the ruts of other cars. I attended school District #25 a two room school just west of our Mayhew Lake farm house. In the seventh grade Helen Haldridge was the teacher, she hired me to start the morning fire in the wood furnace. She paid me ten cents a day.

I attended High School at Sauk Rapids and was the Pitcher for the Mayhew Lake baseball team. During the games, when Emil Rajowski (the manager) would tip his hat, that meant walk the batter. When playing St. Stephen, Lawrence Rajowski was angry with Emil for walking all those batters saying, "let them hit it, then I'll catch them out." To me, Tony Rajkowski was the best all around player in the area.

My father and I moved to Foley after my mother's death in 1944. My sister Mary Ellen and her daughter lived there with us because her husband Leo was in the Army. I worked

in the Semera Pool Hall in Foley. Later we moved to the house my grandfather built at 125 2nd Avenue North East, St. Cloud, MN. In St. Cloud I worked for Eddie Gohls Granite Shop. Then I went to New Ulm and drove truck for the Studer Livestock Company. I also played baseball with the New Ulm Millers. In the fall of 1946 Leo Bemboom and I went to Jamestown ND and worked in the wheat harvest. Following that we went to Denver CO and worked for Colorado and Southern Rail Road until September of 1950.

I was then inducted into the U.S. Army in Minneapolis, MN. I was sent to Fort Leonardwood, MO, and then to

Camp Rucker, Alabama for basics. There also was cold weather training at Camp Mc Coy WI and then to Southern Pines NC for maneuvers with the 11th Airborne Division. My next move was Puson, Korea in February of 1953. I was assigned to the 50th engineers Port Construction Company. Then to Inchon, Korea to remove a dredge sunk by the Chinese Army; to prevent the ship from entering locks to tidal basin. November 1954 I was discharged at Fort Belvior, Virginia at Rank E-5 Sargent.

I then returned to St. Cloud and stayed with my father for a time. Then to Fairbanks,

Alaska. There I worked for Fairbanks Exploration Company in gold mining. June 1956 I went to work for the U.S.Air Force at Eielson Airbase as a painter. March 1962 I transferred from Alaska Air Command to tactical Air Command at George Airbase, CA. There I was promoted to painting supervisor.

June 2, 1962 I married Edna Farber whom I met in Alaska, Her home was Herkimer, New York. We were married in St. Joan of Arc Catholic Church, Victorville, CA. July 1962 Edna and I purchased a home in Apple Valley, CA. Edna worked at George Airbase as a civilian personel specialist. She retired in 1970. I retired in 1983. Edna passed away June 7, 1990. September of that year I was appointed to the Apple Valley Economic Development Commission by the Mayor.

I've made 6 trips to Europe; visiting many countries, especially Oberbruck, Alsace, France. The Birthplace of my great grandfather Amandus Studer. As of this date (4-15-92) I personally know 13 families of Studers in the Oberbruck area and exchange Christmas greetings with them each year.
